## SPEAKER BIOGRAPHIES

### ZHENG WANG

Associate Professor and Director, Center for Peace and Conflict Studies, School of Diplomacy and International Relations, Seton Hall University

Professor Wang's research interests include Chinese politics and foreign policy, nationalism, and conflict resolution. He is the author of *Never Forget National Humiliation: Historical Memory in Chinese Politics and Foreign Relations* (Columbia, 2012), which won the International Studies Association's Yale H. Ferguson Award. He is also the co-editor of *Clash of National Identities: China, Japan, and the East China Sea Territorial Dispute* (Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars Press, 2013) and *Contested Memories and Reconciliation Challenges: Japan and the Asia-Pacific on the 70th Anniversary of the End of World War II* (Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars Press, 2015). Professor Wang has been a Global Fellow at the Kissinger Institute on China and the United States of the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars; a member of the National Committee on United States-China Relations (NCUSCR); Senior Visiting Fellow at the China Center for the South China Sea Studies of Nanjing University; Jennings Randolph Senior Fellow at the United States Institute of Peace (USIP); and Senior Visiting Research Fellow at the National University of Singapore.

## SPEAKER BIOGRAPHIES

### VICTOR CHA

D.S. Song-KF Endowed Chair in Government and International Affairs, Georgetown University, and Senior Advisor and Korea Chair, Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS)

Professor Cha is the author of *Alignment Despite Antagonism: The United States-Korea-Japan Security Triangle* (Stanford University Press, 1999), winner of the 2000 Ohiro Book Prize; *Nuclear North Korea: A Debate on Engagement Strategies*, with David Kang (Columbia, 2004); *Beyond the Final Score: The Politics of Sport in Asia* (Columbia, 2009); and *The Impossible State: North Korea, Past and Future* (Ecco, 2012), selected by Foreign Affairs magazine as a 2012 “Best Book on Asia and the Pacific.” He also has a forthcoming book, *Powerplay: Origins of the American Alliance System in Asia* (Princeton). His articles have appeared in journals including *Foreign Affairs*, *International Security*, *Political Science Quarterly*, *Survival*, *International Studies Quarterly*, and *Asian Survey*. From 2004 to 2007, Professor Cha served as Director for Asian Affairs at the White House on the National Security Council (NSC), where he was responsible primarily for Japan, the Korean peninsula, Australia/New Zealand, and Pacific Island nation affairs.

### SUSAN J. PHARR

Edwin O. Reischauer Professor of Japanese Politics, and Director, WCFIA Program on U.S.-Japan Relations, Harvard University

Professor Pharr has published extensively on Japanese democracy, civil society, media, and foreign policy from comparative and global perspectives. She is the author of *Political Women in Japan* (California, 1981) and *Losing Face: Status Politics in Japan* (California, 1990), and co-editor of *Media and Politics in Japan* (Hawaii, 1996), *Disaffected Democracies* (Princeton, 2000), and *The State of Civil Society in Japan* (Cambridge, 2003). At Harvard, she has served as Chair of the Government Department and the Associate Dean of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences. She has also been Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Asia Foundation; a Commissioner of the Japan-U.S. Friendship Commission; and a member of the U.S. panel of the U.S.-Japan Conference on Cultural and Educational Interchange (CULCON). In 2008, the Japanese Government honored Professor Pharr with the Imperial Decoration of the Order of the Rising Sun, Gold Rays with Neck Ribbon, in recognition of her distinguished contributions to the study of Japan and U.S.-Japan relations.

## SPEAKER BIOGRAPHIES

### SHEILA SMITH

Senior Fellow for Japan Studies, Council on Foreign Relations

Dr. Sheila Smith is the author of *Intimate Rivals: Japanese Domestic Politics and a Rising China* (Columbia, 2015) and *Japan's New Politics and the U.S.-Japan Alliance* (Council on Foreign Relations, 2014). She is a regular contributor to the CFR blog Asia Unbound, as well as to major media outlets in the United States and Asia. She is also Vice Chair of the U.S. advisors to the U.S.-Japan Conference on Cultural and Educational Exchange (CULCON). Dr. Smith has been a visiting scholar or researcher at Keio University, University of Tokyo, University of the Ryukyus, Japan Institute of International Affairs and Research Institute for Peace and Security. She joined CFR from the East-West Center in 2007, where she directed a multinational research team on the domestic politics of the U.S. military presence in Japan, South Korea, and the Philippines. She teaches as an adjunct professor at the Asian Studies Department of Georgetown University and serves on the board of its Journal of Asian Affairs. In the fall of 2014, Smith began a new project on Northeast Asian Nationalisms and Alliance Management.

### AKIO TAKAHARA

Professor, Faculty of Law and Graduate School of Law and Politics, University of Tokyo

Professor Takahara's research interests include Chinese politics, political economy, and foreign relations; Japan-China relations; and international relations of East Asia. His many books include *The Politics of Wage Policy in Post-Revolutionary China* (Macmillan, 1992), *New Developments in East Asian Security* (Akashi Shoten, 2005, co-editor, in Japanese), *The History of Japan-China Relations 1972-2012, Volume One: Politics* (University of Tokyo Press, 2012, co-editor, in Japanese), *Modern History of Japan-China Relations* (Yuhikaku Publishing Co., 2013, co-author, in Japanese), and *Toward the Era of Developmentalism, 1972-2014* (Iwanami Shoten, 2014, co-author, in Japanese). Professor Takahara has been a Visiting Scholar at the Consulate-General of Japan in Hong Kong (1989-91), the Japanese Embassy in Beijing (1996-98), the Fairbank Center for East Asian Research at Harvard (2005-06), and at the School of International Studies, Peking University (2014-15). He also serves as the Vice Dean of the Graduate School of Public Policy (GraSPP) at the University of Tokyo, and as Senior Fellow at Tokyo Foundation.
